Simon Forrest is currently working in the School of Medicine and Health at Durham University. He is also a consultant to Working With Men and a trustee of AVERT (The AIDS Education and Research Trust). He has previously been Director of the Sex Education Forum, a Research Fellow in the Department of Sexually Transmitted Diseases at University College London and a senior lecturer at St George's Hospital Medical School where he now holds an honorary post. He was also a visiting Fellow in to the Institute of Education in the University of London between 1997 and 2002. He has been involved in a wide range of research and evaluation projects with a focus on young people, sex, sexuality and gender. He was worked in higher education for around fifteen years and, before that, in health promotion, youth work and teaching in secondary and further education. Simon has a special interest in gender, sex and sexuality and young people and undertaking small scale evaluations of work with boys, young men and young fathers. He has written, taught and advised policy-makers and practitioners on these issues.
